One of Yorio's favorite come-ons to date was the woman who claimed to be a Vogue editor, Andrea Leon Talley. For those of you who don't know it, it's Andre Leon Talley, and he's a very visible 6-foot, 7-inch man.

While, overall, Yorio says, the throng at the just-concluded shows was very wellbehaved, he did see one totally forged set of credentials - complete with photograph and Olympus Fashion Week logo.

Unfortunately, the would-be crasher didn't know there's a tiny little secret on real credentials. Hence, he was out, and his fake ID is probably still in Yorio's pocket.
